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\*Based on a retrospective study conducted at 2 affiliated university hospitals; n=214 patient charts with surgery dates ranging from February 2022 to June 2023. Patient events were charted by the WOC nurse at each pouch change; review captured up to 5 pouch changes or 2 weeks of data. Statistical analysis controlled for key differences between sites and found predicted probability of leakage for SeriSura Mio was 15.1% and Hollister\* CeraPlus\* was 25.6%, corresponding to a 40.8% lower risir (p=0.013). ## **ADULT VACCINATIONS**

The AARP recommends 8 vaccinations in adults over 50 years old. Some are relatively new. They are:

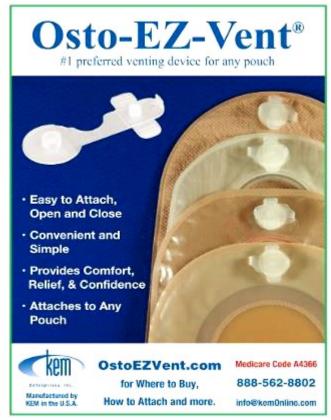
- Influenza—once a year, usually in the fall. This year's vaccine is now available. If you are over 65 be sure to ask for the Fluzone High-Dose seasonal vaccine. It has 4 times more protection.
- COVID-19—Age 19-64: 1 or more doses of 2024–2025 vaccine. Age 65 or older: 2 or more doses of 2024 -2025 vaccine. Per the CDC at <a href="https://www.cdc.gov/vaccines/hcp/imz-schedules/adult-age.html">https://www.cdc.gov/vaccines/hcp/imz-schedules/adult-age.html</a>
- RSV– Recommended for age 75 and older. Age 50 –75 if living in nursing home or have certain medical conditions. Only 1 shot needed, no boosters. Talk to your doctor if you are unsure.
- Pneumococcal- Adults who haven't received a pneumococcal vaccine should opt for either the PCV15, PCV20 or PCV21. If PCV15 is used, it should be followed by a dose of PPSV23 a year later. (If you're immunocompromised, you may get it sooner.)
- Tdap and/or Td booster— Age 19 and over: 1 dose Tdap, then Td or Tdap booster every 10 years . Tdap protects against Tetanus, Diphtheria, Pertussis, Td protects against Tetanus and Diphtheria.
- Shingles— Age 50 and older: Shingrix vaccine (even if you already had the older vaccine, Shingrix is more effective). Shingrix comes in two doses, spaced two to six months apart.
- Hepatitis A– Age 50 and older at high risk for hepatitis A. Usually after overseas travel to affected areas or close contact with an infected person. Talk to your doctor to assess need.
- Hepatitis B— Age ages 19 to 59 and individuals 60 and older who are at risk for contracting hepatitis B, a liver infection. Transmitted when a body fluid (blood, semen, saliva) from a person infected with the hepatitis B virus enters the body of someone who is not infected. Talk to your doctor to assess need.
